


KING'S COTTAGE | 38 King Edward Street, Amble, Northumberland

Are you sitting comfortably? Then we will begin...



Arrival—There is free and unrestricted parking on the streets around the property

Parking on King Edwards Street itself is not available as it is very narrow. You can unload right outside the cottage before you park up though

Access—Standard check in time is 4pm. We can usually arrange an early check-in (subject to cleaning schedules), just ask us!

It is self check in at King's Cottage, we will issue you with an access code to open the lock box which is located by the front door



Thirsty?—If you are anything like us, you will be ready for a nice cuppa after a long drive! We have provided you with fresh milk, tea, coffee, and sugar so the drinks are on us!

If you need anything else there is a Cooperative supermarket and many other shops within a few minutes' walk of the cottage

Please park respectfully and be mindful of excessive noise, especially at night time

Check out day

Standard check out time is 10am, if you want a late check out please message us

Please ensure all windows and doors are closed and secured, all items of food have been removed from the fridge/freezer, all your possessions are removed from the property, and everything (apart from the fridge/freezer!) is switched off

Please return the keys to the key safe and relock it

What's on the 'telly'?

We have a large SMART TV in the lounge for you to enjoy with the family

If you have a NetFlix account you can use it on this TV, just press the 'NetFlix' button on the remote. Don't forget to log out though before you leave!



I'm freezing!

Do you like a nice cosy log burner? Well we have two!

We also have a modern central heating system which you can easily control using the Hive controller located in the dining room



Alfresco dining?

We have a lovely outdoor area for you to enjoy, and we have cushions for the seating which can be found in the outside storage box

Rubbish!

If you happen to fill the bin in the cottage please place additional rubbish in the wheelie bins located in the alleyway. Green bin is normal waste, blue bin is recycling

You can recycle paper, card, cardboard, food and drink cans, aerosols, and plastic bottles but NOT glass bottles. Glass can be recycled at The Braid carpark or The Bluebell Inn carpark



Cooking up a storm

Please ensure the child-lock button is off when using the hob. Also you will need to place the pans on the hob before you switch it on. Dishwasher tablets should be provided.

Instructions for all appliances can be found in the large drawer of the console table in the dining room. Heavy duty shopping bags are provided for guest use and are located in one of the kitchen cupboards

Important information regarding the wood burners

Please do not burn anything in the stove other than seasoned (dried out for 1 year or more) timber that has been produced specifically for use in stoves. Initial wood and kindling provided. Please empty the grate after each use. Instructions for the log burner in the dining room can be found with the user manuals in the console table. Instructions for the log burner in the Lounge: Before lighting, ensure both levers at the bottom of the log burner are fully out. Start the fire with a firelighter, kindling and one log. Once the temperature needle on the flue gets to the white arc then press the left-hand lever in fully. Use the right-hand lever to control the intensity of the fire. Optimal temperature is within the white arc on the thermometer.

Use caution when opening the stove door. The stoves gets VERY hot. Please do not allow small children or pets near to the stoves when it is lit. Use of the stoves must only be carried out by a responsible adult. If in doubt about anything, please get in touch with us for advice



Here are a few local watering holes we would recommend you try!

Jaspers, Bridge Street – amazing family run seafood restaurant. It is small, so book early to avoid disappointment

The Lounge Bar, Bridge Street – just down from Jaspers. Great bar, with live local music on a Sunday afternoon – highly recommend

The Old Boathouse, Amble Harbour Village – lovely restaurant, specialising in seafood, right on the harbour. Outdoor seating with heaters. Recommend booking in advance for evening sittings.

Radcliffes, just off Coquet Street – great for breakfast. Large selection of gins and beers on offer. Dog friendly

Lily's Landing, just off Leazes Street – great setting for breakfast, lunch and drinks. Dog friendly

The Fish Shack, Amble Harbour – seafood restaurant, featured on The Hairy Bikers

Taj Mahal, Queen Street – nice Indian restaurant on the main road, opposite the Co-op. Offers dine in and takeaway

Wellwood Arms, Albert Street – friendly local pub, offering usual pub grub. Dog friendly

Spurelli's, Leazes Street – offers ice-cream and sweet treats. Often a queue down the road, a popular spot!

The Harbour Inn, Leazes Street – newly refurbished pub. Dog friendly and serves food as well as drinks

Hithe, Queen Street – amazing breakfast/brunch/lunch place. Licensed and dog friendly. Great vibe

Vista's Wine Bar, High Street – lovely new wine bar above Rossini's Italian restaurant. Dog friendly





A few places to check out while in the area...

Queen Street – essentially the main road in Amble. Has a Co-op and Tesco, cash points, takeaways, restaurants, a Butcher and local shops. A 5 min stroll from the cottage.

Amble Harbour – Amble Harbour Village is a collection of small local businesses operating out of cute little shacks adjacent to the harbour. In the area are a collection of restaurants and shops for you to explore

Little Shore – close to the lighthouse and harbour in Amble. A small sandy beach, perfect for a paddle. Only dog friendly in winter (Oct-Apr)

Warkworth – a fantastic long sandy beach that goes on for miles. Dog friendly all year round. Turn right just after the bridge in Warkworth and follow the signs. Free car parking. Can walk along the beach towards Amble (right) and follow a circular route between the dunes back to the car park. Warkworth itself is a lovely little town, with plenty of eating and drinking options, a great riverside walk and an impressive castle.

Druridge Bay Beach and Country Park – lovely spot for either a beach walk or a circular walk around the lake. Dog friendly all year round. Just off the A1068 after the small hamlet of Radcliffe. There is either a Pay and Display car park at the Country Park, or free parking higher up the beach (turn left as the road bends just after Radcliffe. It's not signposted but takes you to a road adjacent to the beach where you can park for free. (A relatively unknown spot unless you're local).

Bamburgh – Famous for its castle and long sandy beaches, and voted the best seaside location in the UK for 2 years running. Small high street with places to eat and shop. Can get busy, so may be best to get there early if you want to explore.

Alnmouth - beautiful small town, on the harbour. Worth a visit

Alnwick – well known town in Northumberland. Alnwick Castle was featured in Harry Potter and is a lovely town with plenty of shops and restaurants. The Tree House restaurant at the Castle is well worth a visit, but we suggest you book as it is a popular spot. Barter Books in town is a good find – a renovated train station that boasts a café in the old Waiting Room!

Craster – famous for its crabs and kippers. You can walk from Craster, past the impressive Dunstanburgh Castle to Low Newton by Sea, where you can grab a drink and a popular local crab sandwich at The Ship Inn.

Holy Island – around an hour from the cottage. Accessible across the causeway only at low tide, so check your timings before you visit. The Barn at Beal restaurant just before the Island is worth a stop.
